When I left for the trip I had no idea what I would come out of it with, aside from a course credit – hopefully! I knew little of Israel, the Jewish culture, or of the current political affairs of the area.

The trip was extremely valuable for me, not only because of the extensive, and well put-together course material, but because of the culture that we were able to experience and the social dynamic we were exposed to. It is one thing to read about the Palestinian-Israeli conflict, and another thing to be able to go to the walls of the West Bank and see for yourself.

I knew very little about religion before embarking on my trip — and by the end I was well-versed in the religious history and was taking tours of the tunnels of the Old City and visiting the Church of the Holy Sepulcher and the Dome of the Rock. I am a 2014 participant in the Hebrew University Mishpatim program, and I would like to thank you for helping me to take part in this opportunity.

This program has been an amazing chance to not only visit one of the most historically important regions in the world, but to also gain a better understanding of the complexities that are grappled with here today. I came into this program with a very limited understanding of Israeli society, and I can't imagine that I would ever have learned as much if I hadn't had the opportunity to come and see the reality on the ground and to learn from teachers who live that reality each day. Much of the complexity gets lost in translation between daily life here and media in North America.

It has also been an excellent opportunity to draw comparisons between Canada and Israel, and to see how influential some aspects of Canadian jurisprudence have been. We can also draw many parallels between legal issues faced in Canada regarding Aboriginals and multicultural accommodations, and those faced in Israel regarding Arab, Ultra Orthodox, and other minorities. Professor Schwartz has done an outstanding job of provoking thoughtful discussion on this topic. It has been an excellent opportunity to view Canada through a more critical lens, which is something any citizen in a democratic country should strive to do in hope of working toward improvement.

The field trips are also a wonderful tool to enhance the program, providing some historical benefit through trips to Masada and Yad Vashem, and contributing to understanding of the contemporary setting through trips to the Supreme Court and the African Refugee Development Centre. We have also done some exploring in our own time, and one of the highlights of my experience here was finding the Jerusalem Boxing Club, a non-profit club where Ashkenazi, Mizrahi, and Arabs train together.
