Yude M. Henteleff Prizes in Human Rights and Civil Liberties

An endowment fund of \$20,000 has been established at the University of Manitoba to provide two annual prizes called the Yude M. Henteleff Prizes in Human Rights and Civil Liberties. The Manitoba Scholarship and Bursary Initiative has made a contribution to this fund. The available annual interest from the fund will be used to offer two prizes of equal value.

One prize will be offered to the student who achieves highest standing in Human Rights and Civil Liberties (currently numbered LAW 3018).

A second prize will be offered to a student who:

- (1) has completed the third year of study in the Faculty of Law;
- (2) has demonstrated an active interest in human rights and civil liberties through active involvement as a volunteer in endeavors such as Pro Bono Canada, the University Law Clinic, the Manitoba Association of Rights and Liberties, Amnesty International, Legal Education Action Fund, Canadian Lawyers for International Human Rights, and/or any other human rights organization.

In any given year, if the selection committee finds that there are two candidates for the second prize who are very close in their respective achievements, three quarters (75%) of the funds available for the second prize may be offered to the highest-ranked candidate and the remaining one quarter (25%) of the funds available for the second prize may be offered to the second highest-ranked candidate.

In each case, the selection committee shall be named by the Dean of the Faculty of Law and shall include the donor (or designate).

The Board of Governors of the University of Manitoba has the right to modify the terms of this award if, because of changed conditions, it becomes necessary to do so. Such modification shall conform as closely as possible to the expressed intention of the donor in establishing the award.
